in the dark.

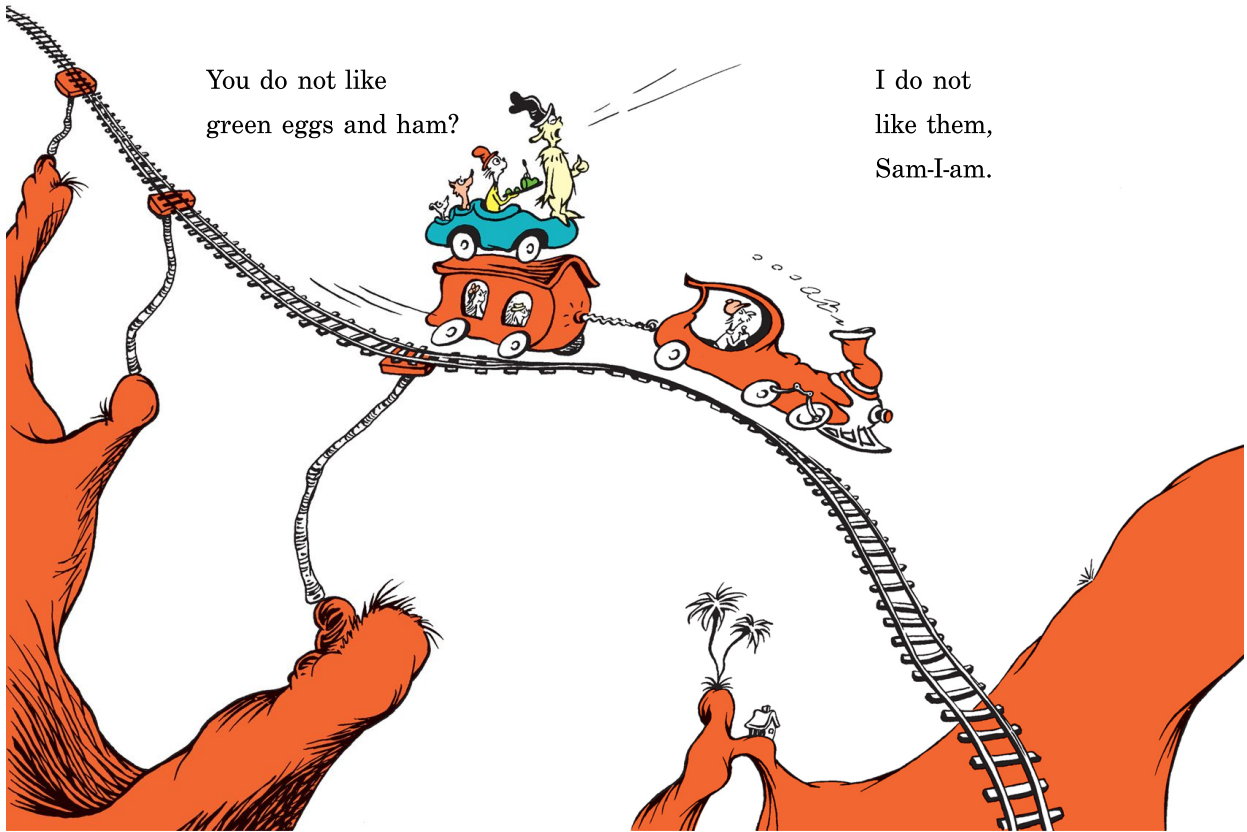


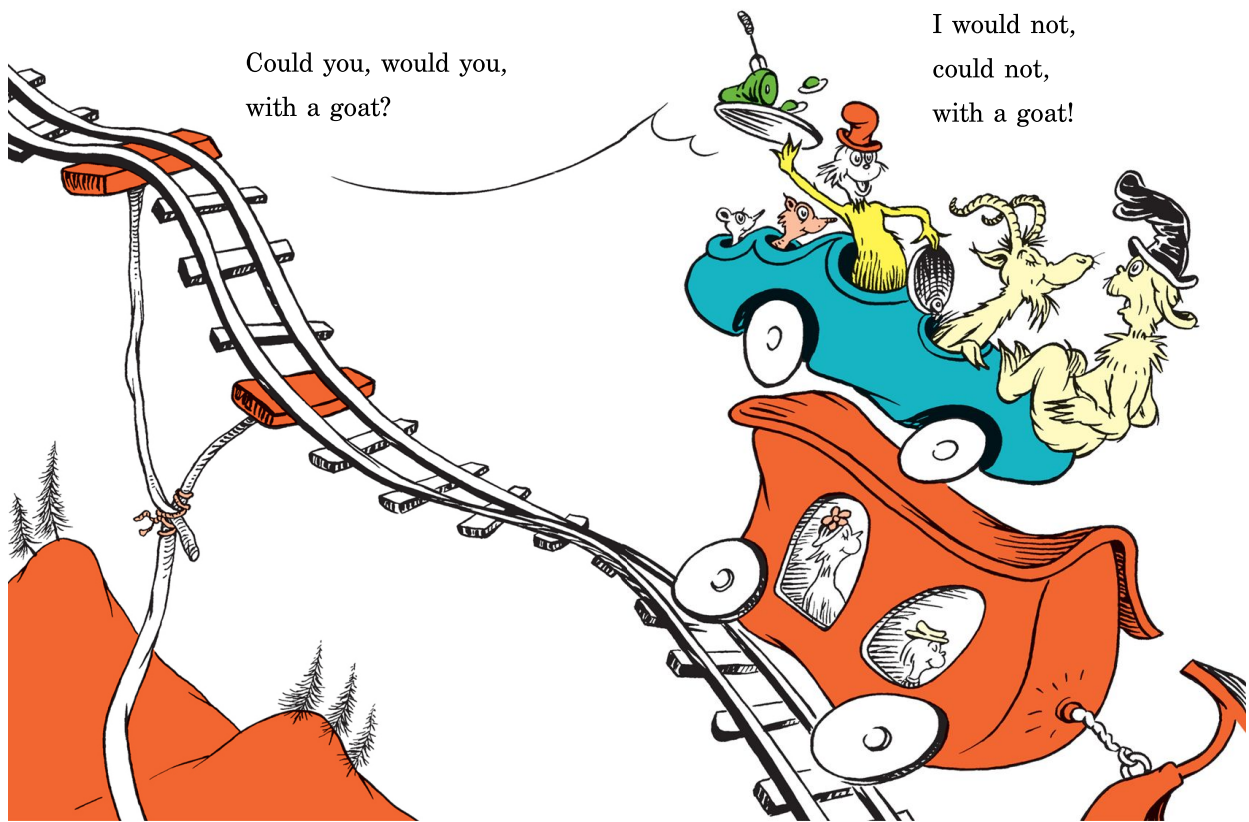

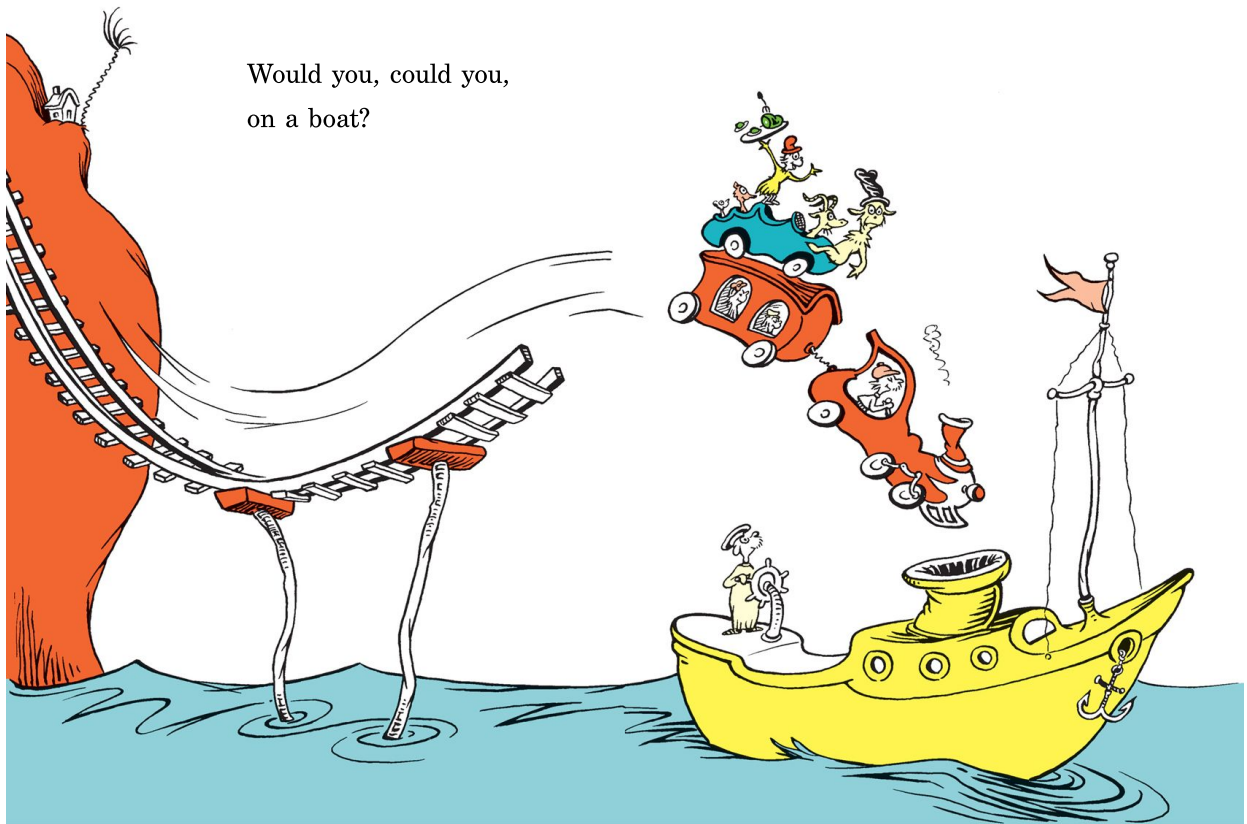

I do not like them in a box.

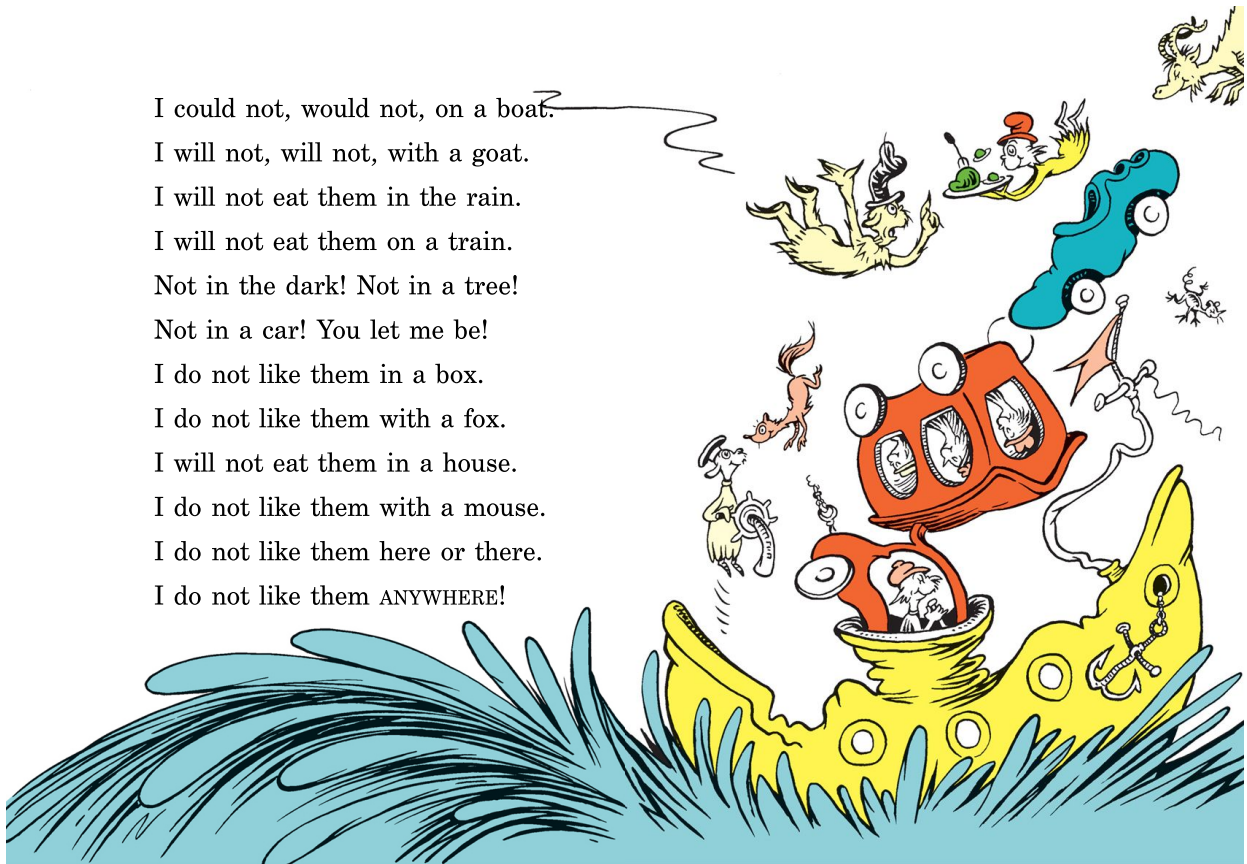

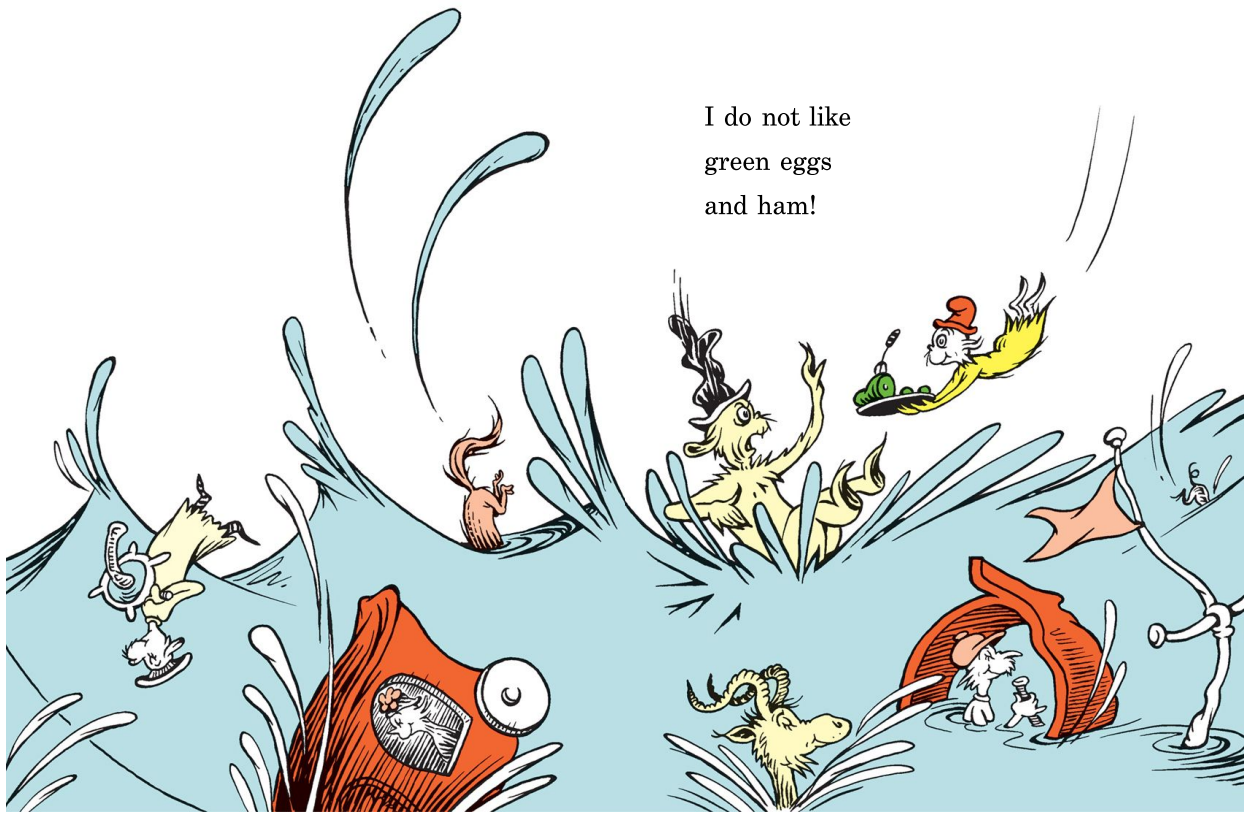

And I would eat them with a goat . . .

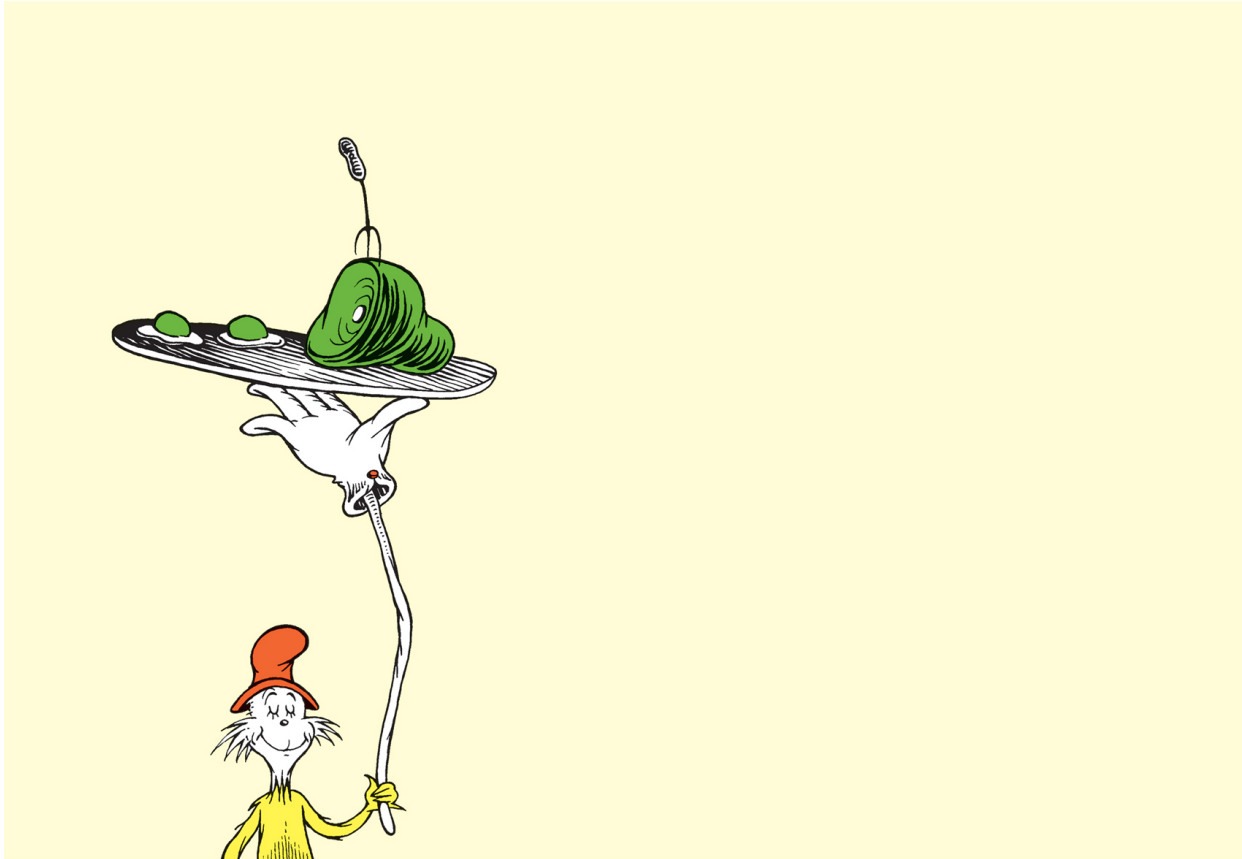
And I will eat them in the rain.
